## Evadne O'Neal celebrates 100th birthday

Evadne O'Neal celebrated her 100th birthday with two celebrations last weekend.

Mrs. O'Neal was born on Jan. 20, 1917 in Trio, S.C. She spent most of her early years in South Carolina. Her father died of typhoid fever when she was around four, and her mother moved quite a bit as she attempted to provide for her and her younger brother.

ily resided in Hartsville, where Mr. O'Neal was a carpenter and all-round handyman.

Evadne spent most of her life in Darlington County where she worked various jobs, including McCellan's Dime store in Darlington and on her father-in-law's farm located off Indian Branch Road. She worked in the Darlington mill, N.C.C.I. for 25 years. Then she helped out at her son's restaurant on Main Street in Olanta for eight years before retiring in 1992.

"She has always been a hardworking woman," commented her eldest son, Ed O'Neal.

Mrs. O'Neal attributes her long life to "working hard and trusting the Lord."

She lived independently until two years ago when she moved into Pee Dee Gardens, said Ed.

Mrs. O'Neal says her favorite activity was gardening and yard work. She also

enjoyed embroidery, she added.

Today, Mrs. O'Neal says she sleeps a lot and watches television, including two soap operas that she has followed for many years.

The centenarian has seven grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

Her advice for living is simple:

"Just take one day at a time."
