Upper Falls Square Apartments



ePaul, State, County and local government officials, along with Christa Construction, SWBR Architects and financial and community partners announced the opening of the Upper Falls Square Apartments in Rochester, New York, a new \$48 million affordable development that offers housing with support services to the community. The multi-story 142,000square-foot complex features two buildings containing a total of 150 apartments, 75 of which will include services to help individuals with a mental health diagnosis live independently.

"Upper Falls Square Apartments will serve as a cornerstone to the ongoing revitalization of this great community while simultaneously helping to combat climate change," Governor Andrew Cuomo said. "Investing in affordable housing tied to health care and other resources is essential to ensuring that all New Yorkers have a safe and decent place to call home."

Upper Falls Square joins revitalization efforts taking place in the neighborhood, including the expansion of the Anthony L. Jordan Health Center across the street, which will offer on-site health and wellness classes to Upper Falls Square Apartments residents. The development is among the first in the State to be supported by New York State Homes and Community Renewal's (HCR) Green Bonds program, which issues tax-exempt bonds certified by The Climate Bond Initiative, an international not-for-profit organization supporting financing for projects around the world that reduce the emissions of greenhouse gases.

"This affordable housing project will provide new housing options for low- and middle-income residents and offer support services for individuals with special needs," said Lieutenant Governor

Kathy Hochul. "We're supporting affordable housing across the state to ensure all New Yorkers have a good place to live without the burden of high cost. The Upper Falls Square Apartments are continuing the momentum of growth in Rochester and moving the Finger Lakes forward."

Upper Falls Square Apartments were built on about three acres of property that was once the site of condemned homes until they were razed by the City of Rochester.

Each apartment features a fully equipped kitchen, a wall-mounted flat screen TV including basic cable service, and in-unit storage. Heat, air conditioning, hot water and electric are included in the rent and community laundry facilities are available at no cost to the tenant. Tenants have access to a lounge on each floor and a community room. Complimentary Wi-Fi is available in common areas in the buildings.

In order to meet the standards of HCR's Green Bonds program, Upper Falls Square Apartments has been designed to the requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Energy Star Programs. Building A, the Ellen Stubbs Apartments, is certified with the Energy Star Multifamily High-Rise program and Building B, the Minister Raymond & Maxine Scott Apartments, is designed to exceed the efficiency of the Energy Star Certified Homes program. Both buildings incorporate "green" features, including photovoltaic panels for the use of solar energy; high efficiency heating and cooling units; Energy Star rated appliances and lighting fixtures; low or no VOC paints, primers, adhesives and sealants; and green label plus carpeting.

Apartments transformed a vacant property
into a vibrant, affordable community that
expands housing opportunities to hundreds

of low-income New Yorkers and provides the supportive services necessary to help keep our most vulnerable neighbors housed. By investing in affordable housing, we are strengthening the economic foundation of Rochester's Northeast Quadrant and keeping the Finger Lakes region's economy moving forward."

New York State Office of Mental Health Commissioner Dr. Ann Marie T. Sullivan said, "OMH is proud to work with partners in the public and private sectors to bring stable and secure housing with services to vulnerable New Yorkers who are making progress toward recovery. Upper Falls Square Apartments is a beautiful addition to the neighborhood, and its supportive housing units will help individuals who want to be independent and productive members of their community."

Senator Joseph E. Robach said, "Today's opening of Upper Falls Square Apartments is exciting news for the City of Rochester and the individuals and families who will call this development home. With these buildings offering housing as well as support services, this development will allow households of diverse backgrounds the ability to access critically important housing opportunities."

Assembly Majority Leader Joseph D. Morelle said, "As a community, we understand that building strong neighborhoods starts with ensuring every person and family has access to a stable, secure, and affordable place to call home. The completion of the Upper Falls Square Apartments takes us one step closer to this goal by expanding access to affordable housing options and critical support services, ultimately providing hard-working families with the opportunity to grow and thrive."

Assemblymember David F. Gantt said, "It is with great pleasure that I congratulate DePaul on your completion of Upper Falls Square. As someone who grew up in the area, I can state unequivocally that this project is long overdue. It will transform the landscape of this neighborhood, and should serve as a catalyst for the development of the area. The combination of high-quality affordable apartments with amenities such as flat screen televisions, free utilities and free laundry, along with supportive services for many of the residents, means that these apartments are more than just living spaces. They will transform the lives of the people who live there."

Assemblyman Harry Bronson said, "I applaud the Governor and my partners in government for making this project a reality. Safe, affordable housing is critical to the wellbeing of our city, and this successful project will expand the number of available apartments for families in our community, and do so in an environmentally sustainable way."

Monroe County Executive Cheryl Dinolfo said, "Affordable and supportive housing projects are catalysts for community change and have been proven to increase property values and employment



rates in the neighborhoods they serve. I thank New York State
Homes and Community Renewal for their investment in the new
Upper Falls Square Apartments, which will further enhance Monroe

across our community."

Rochester Mayor Lovely Warren said, "I want to congratulate DePaul on the successful completion of the Upper Falls Square Apartments, which is the first major housing development on Hudson Avenue in more than three decades. I am grateful to see this level of investment in Northeast Rochester, and I want to thank New York State Homes and Community Renewal and the New York State Office of Mental Health for supporting this development. The expansion of high-quality affordable housing in our city supports our goals of creating more jobs, safer/more vibrant neighborhoods and better educational opportunities."

The combination of the quality of the apartments, the amenities and the wraparound services means that not only will these apartments transform the landscape of the neighborhood, it will transform the lives of its residents as well. I also want to thank Mayor Lovely Warren and other community leaders for partnering with DePaul on this transformative project. A neighborhood that has been neglected for decades is now being revitalized."

Northeast District Councilmember Michael A. Patterson

I was recently made aware that the City of Rochester has a deficit of 16,000 affordable housing units. Building A, which contains 114 apartments, is named the Ellen Stubbs Apartments. Ellen Stubbs, who passed away in 2012, was known for her commitment and generosity not only in her local community but in the world. She worked as a nurse for over 50 years and advocated for the community through her work with local organizations including the Anthony L. Jordan Health Center, the Community Health Care Association of New York State, the YWCA, the Coalition of NorthEast Associations (CONEA), Baden Street Settlement, Wilson Commencement Park and many others.

"DePaul Upper Falls Square epitomizes the spirit of collaboration and dedication that defines our community," said DePaul President Mark Fuller. "We are truly honored and proud to recognize the many significant contributions of the late Ellen Stubbs and Minister Raymond and Maxine Scott who have given so much of themselves and made a lasting, positive impact for many in need."

Building B, containing 36 apartments, is named the Minister Raymond & Maxine Scott Apartments. Minister Scott, along with his wife Maxine Scott, have a decades-long commitment to bettering the Rochester community. Their involvement includes work with the Reynolds Street Church of Christ, Faith Temple and FIGHT. Minister Scott served as the President of FIGHT. as the Director of the Hanover House Ministry, as a Commissioner of the Rochester Housing Authority Board, and

President of the Rochester sub-region of the New York State Northern Region Black Political Caucus reflecting his long history in the civil rights movement. He remains one of the leading figures in Rochester's work for a better community for all.

Minister Scott was director of the DePaul Problem Gamblers Treatment Program and was one of five outsiders called to meet with Attica Prison inmates in an effort to ease tensions during the riot. As a member of the DePaul Community Services Board of Directors, he has passionately worked to help DePaul develop the Upper Falls Square Apartments by tirelessly collaborating with community stakeholders including CONEA, neighbors and businesses in the northeast quadrant, and the Anthony L. Jordan Health Center, creating synergy and excitement about a development that brings needed housing and health and wellness options to a neighborhood in need.

Maxine Scott – whom Minister Scott calls "the wind beneath his wings" – has stood side by side with Minister Scott in all his work for 52 years. She retired after 33 years with the Xerox Corporation and continues to serve her church, Faith Temple, and community as a volunteer.

This building honors the important work Minister and Mrs. Scott have done on behalf of our community, which will continue to impact generations to come.

Ellen Stubbs was active in her church community where she served in several leadership roles. She was the Sunday School Superintendent at the Atlantic Avenue Baptist Church, served on the Board of Trustees at the Greece Baptist Church, and volunteered her time at the Aenon Missionary Baptist Church and the Monroe Baptist Association.

Ellen Stubbs received many awards and recognitions for her outstanding dedication and service. She was especially honored to be recognized by the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs for her vision, fortitude and courage in working to uplift and empower professional black women. She served as a delegate to the United Nations Conference on the Status of Women in 1995 in Beijing, China and as a member of the World Conference Against Racism in 2001 in Durban, South Africa.

This building honors her generous spirit and builds on her legacy of working to provide opportunities and improve lives in our community.

DePaul Hosts 27th Annual Smouse Tournament

Development Updates

DePaul is increasing its ability to serve even more people in need with new projects in the works for affordable housing and supported housing across all its programs.

Permits and funding have been obtained and construction began on the **Knitting Mill Apartments** in Perry, New York. The Knitting Mill Apartments represent the adaptive reuse of the former Perry Knitting Mill which involves transforming the former site into a 48-unit apartment building.

Site work is anticipated to begin on the **DeWitt Clinton Apartments**, a new 80-unit facility in Rome, New York, in fall 2018. The community will include a 66-unit apartment building and 14 townhouses. The apartments will provide fully handicap accessible, workforce housing.

Planning has begun for an expansion at DePaul's **Apple Blossom Apartments** in Cheektowaga, New York. The existing Apple Blossom building would be renovated and converted to 15 new one-bedroom units and 15 two-bedroom units for seniors. In addition, two brand new 40-unit buildings would be constructed, with one of the buildings equipped with sensory devices for persons who may be Deaf, Hard of Hearing and those using American Sign Language (ASL). The goal is to close on this project by the end of 2018.

Wexford House, a DePaul Senior Living Community in Denver, North Carolina, is undergoing upgrades including adding 20 beds to make it an 80-bed community. In addition, updates include new flooring and lighting in hallways, increasing the ceiling height in the lobby, a new portico in front of the building, improvements to the parking lot and a fresh coat of paint.

Improvements at **Parkside**, a Community Residence-Single Room Occupancy Program in East Rochester, New York, include an updated medication room and front desk, new flooring, new showers in the community bathrooms, upgrades to the HVAC system, kitchen and elevators as well as new wallpaper in some areas of the building. Completed renovations also include a new generator, front sidewalk, intercoms and an updated security camera system.

The **Ridgeview Commons** Apartment Treatment Program in Rochester, New York received a new fitness center, conference and storage room, an expanded community room, six new office cubicles and updates to the medication room.

Mental Health First Aid



Just as Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) helps even those without clinical training assist an individual having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person experiencing a mental health crisis.

Mental Health First Aid is an evidence-based public education

program that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact and reviews appropriate support. The eight-hour course, which has been offered at DePaul since August 2016, is proven to improve people's mental health, increase the understanding of mental health issues and treatments, connect more people with care and reduce the stigma associated with mental illness.

"This important educational effort goes a lot further than emergency intervention; it really helps people understand the shroud of fear and misjudgment facing individuals and families who experience mental illness and addiction," said Director of Staff Development and Training Nancy McGovern.

A total of 189 DePaul employees have completed the course to date. It is taught by Intake Director Yvonne Adams and Parkside Program Director Jennifer Robinson.

DePaul's Digital Content Coordinator Justine Smith said the training was thought-provoking, informative and practical.

"Since one in five adults experience a mental illness in a given year, chances are we all know someone who has a mental illness," Smith adds. "The skills taught in Mental Health First Aid are extremely practical and could be utilized to help any person, not just someone served by DePaul. Everyone is dealing with something and we all face challenges, so it's imperative to be kind and listen non-judgmentally."





A Journey to Recovery



It can be difficult to convey the personal challenges that accompany living with a mental health diagnosis. Jeanet H., a Residential Assistant at DePaul's Neighborhood of the Arts (NOTA) Apartment Treatment Program in Rochester, New York, has become the voice and face behind the "Who Do We Serve" presentation during DePaul's New Employee Orientation. She presents in-person

to newly hired staff in Rochester and her presentation has been recorded for audiences in Buffalo, New York.

Although she'd describe herself as being shy and laid back, she said she realizes it is important to share her story with others - from being diagnosed with borderline personality disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder and impulsiveness with a chemical imbalance after high school to graduating from community college and landing a job at DePaul.

When she fulfilled a lifelong dream, graduating from Monroe Community College in 2010, DePaul staff were there in the audience cheering her on. Now Jeanet herself is a DePaul employee and has since moved into DePaul's Supported Housing Program. She began as a Certified Living Assistant in 2010 and was promoted to Residential Assistant at NOTA. Jeanet said she loves working with her peers.

"I know where they are coming from," she said. "I've walked in their shoes. If you respect the clients, they will respect you."
